It gives me great pleasure to present the seventy-first annual report of the Teachers' Refresher Course Committee.

The 2015/16 year has seen 10 courses run successfully by TRCC. Some of the highlights of the year have been: a course run in partnership with PPTA Wellbeing in Schools: growing safe and peaceful learning communities a first time of running a course with this important focus - a great response of 112 participants. We ran Making Music Matter in partnership with MENZA, attracting 143 participants - it was wonderful seeing this work so successfully as a cross sector course open to Early Childhood, Primary and Secondary. We continued our work with NZ Specialist Classroom Teachers Association running a second symposium and continuing to assist in developing their national network.

We celebrate that our calendar continues to encompass all sectors, in the 15/16 including a course specific to Māori Medium Leaders, a course specific to Pasifika Early Childhood Educators and a course for Alternative Education Educators.

We greatly appreciate the ongoing support and guidance from the three unions: PPTA, NZEI and TEU. This year has seen the PLD sector facing enormous change and we have appreciated our union liaisons advocating so strongly for TRCC and the special nature of the PLD we offer.

We thank our current eleven Committee members who give so generously of their time to support and guide the work. This year we farewell Hayley Searle who has served for six years and Viv Browne who has served for three years and we give immense thanks for their service.

Although at times this year the future for TRCC has been unclear, the Committee chose to 'hold the faith' and have planned a great 2017 calendar. We are really pleased with what will be on offer next year 'for teachers, by teachers'.

I would also like to thank our permanent staff Laura and Chris for their work for TRCC this year.

I'm sure both staff and the committee will have a successful year in 2017, willingly and capably attending to the challenges it will bring.

Teachers' Comments about the most valuable aspects of the course for them:
